Visit to Helen Keller Festival near By

Sometimes you get the opportunity to visit someplace just because it's nearby. Lions Kimberly and Eugene Taylor had that opportunity recently when they went to Tuscumbia, Alabama. While on a visit to Tennessee, they learned that the Helen Keller Festival was taking place in nearby Tuscumbia, Alabama. Neither had ever had the opportunity and it seemed like a good idea. The town is a quiet town with a still small town feel. After parking the car, they walked the streets enjoying the festival activities. There was a car show filled with all types of cars. The shops in the town had hauled their wares out to the street and signs proclaiming "Sale" were everywhere. It seemed the whole town was there. On the courthouse square was a stand and an announcer was announcing winners from numerous raffles.

After strolling around awhile, they decided to walk the 4 blocks to the edge of town and visit the home of Helen Keller, Ivy Green. It was a pleasant walk past yard sales and other walkers. The home is within the city limits even though it was once on over a 600 acre farm. It was a plain unassuming place and felt quite homey. Interestingly enough the house was set as a museum with guided, or self guided tours. The home was filled with period relevant furniture including many original items. There were pictures of many famous people posing with Helen Keller, one among them was Alexander Graham Bell. The water pump we all know about was there and like all tourist Eugene had to give it a test pump. Anne Sullivan's house was immediately adjacent to the main house. It was a relatively small structure yet looked very comfortable. The huge trees provide much need shade and created a feeling of being in a cool glade.

Interestingly enough there were no signs of Lions involvement or activities in the main house or adjacent structures. However, there was a special area in the adjacent garden area dedicated to Helen Keller's relationship with the LIONS. The walkway was filled with bricks with names engraved representing those who had donated to the project. Lions Eugene and Kimberly were excited when they were able to find the names of Missouri Lions Alice and Jerry Hagler on one of the bricks. There were plaques, banners,

pins and awards of all kinds in the display cases. It was a very honorable tribute to the legacy of the Lions' relationship with Helen Keller.

After spending several hours touring the entire place, even as small as it was, it was time to go. As they walked back thru and to town, Lions Kimberly and Eugene reflected on how amazing it was to see such a tribute to a great American woman. How fortunate that it was "nearby" and how fortunate that the time was taken to see it.

Lions: Celebrating World Sight Day in October

Like millions of children around the world, Handapangodage Perera, a fourth-grader at St. Johns School in Panadura, Sri Lanka, did not realize that he could not see well. His vision simply was as it had always been. He had difficulty seeing the teacher at the front of the classroom and focusing on words while reading. He shied away from many outdoor games with other children because his vision prevented him from playing well. Like other children with uncorrected vision problems, Perera's opportunities to succeed in school and at play were limited. More seriously, if not corrected early, some conditions can lead to severe vision loss or even blindness as he grows.

"We are very grateful to the Lion's program," said Perera's father. "The specialist told my son that he would have gone blind in one eye, if not for the timely medical attention provided by the Lions." After multiple screenings, Perera was transferred to a hospital where an eye specialist for children patched his good eye. His vision was soon restored, almost matching his healthy eye. Lions also provided him with free glasses.

"This has made our lives happy, especially for all the service we received from the Lions hospital free of cost. We could not have afforded the specialist treatment, medicines and glasses," said Perera's father. "We wish all success to the Lions who are saviors of children's sight."

Stories like this can be heard around the world each day thanks to Lions. In a more public celebration, Lions will officially mark **World Sight Day** in Istanbul, Turkey on October 11, 2012. International President Wayne A. Madden will lead the events, which will include screenings focusing on diabetic eye diseases, including diabetic retinopathy. Lions have decades of experience in lifting the veil of blindness and improving the lives of people with low vision. Lions also lead the charge around the world to ensure that no people suffering from vision-related ailments are left behind. Thanks to the thousands of Lions who supported this work during Campaign SightFirst II, Lions will remain at the forefront of vision care. The three goals of the SightFirst program reflect the growth of Lions' impact:

- 1. Eliminating major causes of blindness like cataract, trachoma, and river blindness
- 2. **Combating new threats to sight** like low vision, childhood blindness, uncorrected refractive error, diabetic retinopathy
- 3. **Providing "Vision for All"** through vision rehabilitation and education of the blind as well as research for new conditions and therapies

Beyond SightFirst grants, LCIF awards additional grants for Lions' projects that make a difference in the lives of people with vision problems. This month, consider joining the World Sight Day celebration by making a donation and directing that funding to Sight Programs. Do You Have An Old lion To Turn Into a "LION"?

Hang on to those 30-plus year-old toys! Little did Wildwood Area Lions Club past president Jim Kranz realize that hoarding was a plus. In the early 1980s, he purchased a rather large stuffed lion as a Christmas present for his 2-year-old son Brandon, back in Seattle, Washington. Lion Jim was NOT a capital "L" lion at the time

-- he just really liked the size and quality of the lower-case "lion." So did Brandon. "Mister Lion," as he was known, traveled to Wildwood with the Kranz's years later. In 2009, Jim Kranz first discovered International "capital L" Lions when the Wildwood Area Lions Club was chartered and he was its first treasurer. "Mister Lion," in its crouch atop Lion Jim's corvette, was a major hit with youngsters along the City of Wildwood Founders Day Parade -- just as it had been 30 years ago with his own son. In addition to the various awards that Lions Clubs International has to offer for growing membership in the association, our District has implemented two new awards that each Club and Member are eligible to receive.

The **District Victory Award** will be given to <u>any</u> Lions Club that has a plus 1 or more in membership for the period beginning March 1st, 2012 through February 28, 2013. According to the September 2012 Club Health Assessment Report that I receive from Lions Clubs International, 13 Clubs are showing a positive net growth since March 1st. The Club Health Assessment Report is based on WMMR's that were completed by the last day of each month. *PLEASE NOTE*.....if your Club does not file the monthly WMMR, then the information for your Club is not accurate and therefore your Club may not be eligible to receive the District Victory Award.

In addition, the District will also recognize <u>one</u> individual Lion member who sponsors the most new Lions within this same time period with the **Lions Victory Award**. Both the District Victory and Lion Victory Awards will be given at the District Convention.

Free Vision Screening Puts Infant on the Path To Better Vision

Early detection is key to preventing vision loss due to amblyopia and other sight-stealing conditions. And the earlier a condition can be diagnosed, the sooner a child can receive the treatment he or she needs to restore vision. At only seven months old, Natalea received a free Children's Vision Screening (CVS) from the Missouri Lions Eye Research Foundation at her daycare. When her mother, Amanda, received the screening results, she was devastated.

Natalea received a referral for hyperopia, or farsightedness, in both eyes. In fact, according to Jennifer Gallihugh, vision screening specialist for the Foundation, the readings were far over the referral criteria. While Natalea never displayed any signs of a vision problem and she had no known genetic predisposition to hyperopia, her family was all too familiar with the condition.

At 16 months old, Natalea's older brother was diagnosed with both hyperopia and amblyopia, otherwise known as lazy eye, and underwent surgery after glasses and patching failed to correct the conditions. Although it was difficult for Amanda to accept the referral, she went ahead and brought Natalea to St. Louis Children's Hospital for a full dilated exam. Three doctors agreed Natalea required an eyeglass prescription of +8.50 for each eye – twice her brother's prescription.

While the news was shocking, the doctors believe that Natalea's hyperopia was caught early enough that with eyeglasses and treatment, her vision can be preserved and she can likely avoid surgery in the future.

Said Amanda, "I am so thankful you came to our daycare. Without your screening, we would have been in the same boat with Natalea as we were with her brother. We had no clues there was a problem, and if we had waited any longer, her eyes could have been crossed or she would have permanent eye damage. I would definitely recommend the program to anyone."




